

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A Tribute to Dr. Gary Cook

aith, Character, Integrity, Vision, Service...Christ-like traits which have been consistently reflected in the model of servant leadership exemplified by DBU President Dr. Gary Cook. This year, the DBU family celebrates the 15th anniversary of Dr. Gary Cook's leadership as president and honors the tireless commitment and dedicated service of Dr. Cook and his lovely wife, Sheila. In so doing, we also give glory to our Heavenly Father, knowing full well that the abundant blessings we have received as an institution under the godly servant leadership of Dr. Cook come from His provision and His guiding hand.

Fifteen years ago, God ordained a new beginning for Dallas Baptist University by anointing and equipping a leader to move the institution forward and out of the shadows of its past. In April of 1988, the baton of leadership was placed in the hands of the individual who would help build the identity and foundation for today's DBU as a distinctively committed Christcentered institution of higher education. As Dr. Cook took the reins, DBU's enrollment stood at 1,859 students, and the University had endured a past of financial hardship.
