Course Description

An introductory course to counseling for sexual issues. Students are introduced to a Christ-centered theology of sexuality, which addresses biology and psychology, sexual development and dysfunction, client sexual issues in counseling, along with appropriate intervention techniques for sexual problems. Students are also challenged in their growth and development of their own sexuality. Terms Offered: Fall, Spring, Summer.

Learner-Centered Outcomes

Learner-Centered Outcomes and Objectives:

1. Students will demonstrate an ability to integrate their understanding of sexual biology, psychology and Biblical values.

2. Students will demonstrate an understanding of major concepts in the field of human sexuality and intimacy as they relate to a Biblical perspective and as they impact family and couple functioning.

3. Students will demonstrate an understanding of common sexual questions, myths, and problems while developing basic therapeutic answers and interventions consistent with Scripture.

4. Students will demonstrate an ability to diagnose sexual dysfunctions, and effectively dialogue, educate, coach, and/or strategically refer clients with sexual problems from a Biblical framework.

5. Students will demonstrate an understanding and become comfortable with their own sexuality as they practice integrating a Christian worldview into their lives and counseling practice.

Breakdown

Sexual Autobiography Report and Reflection Paper: This paper is designed to encourage personal growth, explore the influence of personal story and values over the future professional experience, and prepare the student for the profession. The specifics of this paper will be given as a handout to the students. Late papers will be deducted 5 points per day. *The paper should be written using <u>12-point</u> font, and double-spaced*.

Sexual Integration Paper - Often identified as one of the most valuable parts of this course, this paper is designed to encourage personal growth and integration of Biblical values in sexuality. It is personal exploration process for professional growth purposes and thus, it is expected that the paper be written academically. The specifics of this paper will be given as a handout to the students. Late papers will be deducted 5 points per day. *The paper should be written using <u>APA format, 12-point font, and double-spaced</u>, utilizing relevant scholarly articles from academic journals and appropriate resources. 20%*

Quizzes: Chapter<u>quizzes</u> will be given over some of the chapters in the text book. They are located in the Quizzes file in Course Materials on Blackboard. Chapter quizzes will be open book & notes. An

average of the quizzes will be one exam grade. Quizzes are also designed to help prepare students for the final exam.

Class Participation / Discussion Board: Class Discussion, online or in the classroom, are designed to help the class learn from peers and form a learning community. Attention should be given to type and depth of response. Late Discussion participation will result in a 5 points deduction for each day late (including weekend days).

Final Exam: The final exam will be online and consists of questions taken from the quizzes. The exam should be completed alone, closed-book/notes within the time provided. The professor will provide information regarding the exam in class.

🧰 Institutional Policies

Requirements for Undergraduate and Graduate Credit

Service-Learning

Service-learning is a teaching and learning strategy which integrates academic instruction, community service, and guided reflection from a Christ-centered, faith-based perspective in order to enhance student learning, to foster global civic responsibility, and to develop servant leaders. All courses play an important role in providing the student with an appropriate curricular foundation for service-learning. Designated service-learning courses incorporate a field-based component to provide the student with a curricular service-learning experience

Financial Aid

Students who are receiving federal, state, or institutional financial aid who withdraw or add hours during the semester may have their financial aid adjusted because of the withdraw or addition. This change in schedule may affect the aid they are receiving during the current semester, and could affect their eligibility for aid in future semesters.

Disabilities

Final Course Grades

Official final course grades are available only online through the WebAdvisor System. The Registrar's Office will only mail grades to a student upon request. The Dallas Baptist University undergraduate and graduate catalogs state that "All accounts must be paid in full before a student can...receive transcripts..." According to FERPA, faculty may not provide final grade information to students via telephone, email, posting or any other source which might compromise student confidentiality.

Children in Classes and Unaccompanied Children

Minors who are not DBU students are not permitted to attend class. Furthermore, minor children may not be unaccompanied on any property owned or operated by Dallas Baptist University. For their safety and welfare, unaccompanied children on any property owned or operated by Dallas Baptist University will be escorted to the Campus Security Office or other duly authorized location and the parents or guardians will be summoned to pick them up immediately.

Cell Phone and Electronic Device Policy

Electronic devices shall only be used for course specific work. The professor reserves the right to ban their use at any time.
