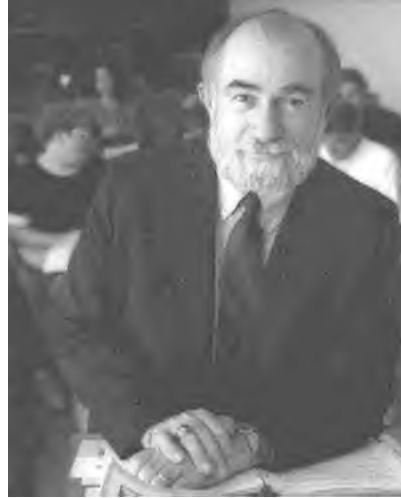

Dr. Os Guinness is a writer and speaker who has written or edited more than twenty books. Since 1984, he has lived in the Washington, DC area. He was a Guest Scholar at the Woodrow Wilson Center for International Studies and then a Guest Scholar and Visiting Fellow at the Brookings Institution. He is a Senior Fellow and vice chairman of the Board of the Trinity Forum.



Walt McDonald was an Air Force pilot, taught at the Air Force Academy, and served as Texas Poet Laureate in 2001. In May 2002, he retired from Texas Tech University as Paul Whitfield Horn Professor of English and Poet in Residence. Walt has twenty collections of poems and a book of fiction.
