

# RUSSELL H. PERRY AWARD DINNER HONORS DAVID DEAN

Former Texas Secretary of State David Dean received the Russell H. Perry Free Enterprise Award at the annual banquet hosted by Dallas Baptist University. U.S. Congressman Kenny Marchant was the keynote speaker for the evening and DBU alumnus and former Russell H. Perry Award recipient J.L. Sonny Williams served as the dinner's chair. Dallas real estate legend and also former award recipient Ebby Halliday Acers was the honorary chair of the event.

The annual gala event marked its


19th anniversary as it continues to honor Dallas leaders whose lives are testimonies of achievement in free enterprise and service to the community. The event

is named in memory of Dallas business leader and philanthropist Russell H. Perry, whose life of service to Dallas impacted many lives. Mrs. Russell H.

(Phoebe) Perry continues to be a friend of the city of Dallas and especially DBU. She and Mr. Perry began their support of the school in the 1960s.

Over the past 19 years, the dinner has honored many North Texas leaders, and in doing so, has raised over \$2 million in scholarship funds for more than 1,000 DBU students.

gressman Marchant underscored the importance of supporting Christian higher education.

"Giving isn't about pocket change; it's about real change in people's lives, the real change that comes when students' dreams are supported by donors' resources, when students leave DBU with an education and a life experience, the real change that comes when we transform today's students into tomorrow's leaders."

As a graduate of a Christian university himself, Congressman Marchant praised DBU's example of Christian higher education. "Christian schools do more than teach students how to read and write, they teach what is right and wrong," he said.

Congressman Kenny Marchant was sworn in on January 4,

2005 as the representative for the 24th Congressional District of Texas. He currently serves on the House Education Committee, the Workforce and Govern-

on receiving this year's Russell H. Perry Free Enterprise Award.

"Many people talk about the American dream, David has lived it—as Texas Secretary of State, international consultant, and, most importantly, as a servant of the community. His greatest legacy is that he has done it so long and so well," he said.

Currently, David Dean is chairman and CEO of Dean International, Inc., and its subsidiary, Innovative Transportation

Strategies. He is also the principal shareholder of David A. Dean & Associates, P.C., a public policy administrative regulatory law firm.

Dean served for 10 years as secretary of state and general counsel for Governor William Clements and as general counsel for Governor Dolph Briscoe.

In his acceptance speech, Dean voiced support for DBU's commitment to Christ-centered quality higher education.

"Dallas Baptist University means so much to so many people," he said. "It's one thing to be a Christian university in name, but it's another thing to be a Christian university in practice."

Dean has previously served as chairman of the Russell H. Perry Free Enterprise Award Dinner and has been an active member of the dinner committee for a number of years. His civic contributions include having served on the boards of Wycliffe Resources, Inc., Greater Dallas Planning Council, National Crime Prevention Council, Methodist Medical Center of Dallas, World Affairs Council of Greater Dallas, Community Council of the Dal-

las VA Medical Center, First Baptist Academy of Dallas, Dallas/Fort Worth International Airport Marketing Committee, the Communities Foundation of Texas Advisory Board, St. Paul Hospital Advisory Board, Chairman of the National Governors Association Task Force on Public Health Issues, Dallas Lighthouse for the Blind, Inc., and the National Alliance Against Drugs. Dean is a member of the Salesmanship Club of Dallas, the Friday Group, Texas Philanthropy, and the Lakeview Prayer Group.

The evening was filled with special moments, including a patriotic tribute to the American Spirit, a moving video tribute to David Dean, and a presentation of the DBU Patriot Baseball Team. Dr. Gary Cook, president of DBU, introduced the

baseball coaches and players, who were clad in their home uniforms with the school colors of red, white, and blue.

"I wanted you to see where your scholarship money is going," explained Dr. Cook. "It is going to help these baseball players, our music students, our business students, so many other students, and people like Kenny Trapp."

Following Dr. Cook's remarks, DBU Head Golf Coach Kenny Trapp came forward to share his testimony of how God has used the ministry of DBU to reshape his life.

A former Patriot Baseball player himself, Trapp helped lead the team to the NAIA World Series tournaments in 2000 and 2001. He came to DBU full of talent but with no relationship to God.

Kenny was living life his own way and had grown tired of seeing the joy many Christians around him experienced and of hearing about the friendship they had with Jesus Christ. Frustrated, he began to contemplate leaving the school.

One evening, while driving off campus, he encountered the statue of Jesus engraved with the question, "Will you follow me?" Trapp recognized he had reached a crossroads in life and quickly went to talk with his coach. Later that evening, Kenny gave his life over to the cause of Christ and for the first time could claim Jesus as his Savior.

"Thank you for providing scholarship help for people like me," said Trapp. "Because without you, I would not have a best friend like Jesus. He has never let me down, and He never will."
