



### Dr. Mike Williams

After 15 years of serving as dean of the College of Humanities and Social Sciences, Dr. Mike Williams will be stepping down to again be a full-time professor of history. Dr. Williams began at DBU as an adjunct professor, prior to becoming full-time in 1995 and accepting the role as dean the following year. During his tenure, Dr. Williams helped guide the college as it expanded its programs and faculty, in addition to helping begin the Honors College at DBU and serving as a member of the DBU self-study committee for the 1998 reaccreditation process.

Having written several articles, Dr. Williams is the author of DBU's centennial history, as well as a biography of Baptist stalwart I.T. Tichenor and *Presidential Hymns*, which he co-wrote with former DBU dean Dr. Edward Spann.

### Greg Hollabaugh

DBU's 2010 yearbook, *The Summit*, was dedicated to Greg Hollabaugh for his many years of service to the University. Since 1985, Mr. Hollabaugh has been a fixture at DBU, serving as Coordinator of Media Services, Resident Director of Williams Hall, and even former Homecoming King.

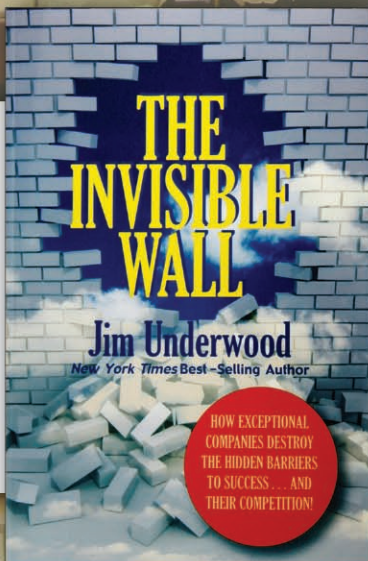

Through real-world examples, Dr. Underwood demonstrates the ways in which to identify and break through these walls and suggests the proper course to avoid the rebuilding of the walls. He describes a course that is marked by servant leadership and care for every employee, top to bottom.
