
### DR. MARCUS GOODLOE SHARES NEW BOOK ON MLK

Dallas Baptist University graduate and nationally recognized speaker, Dr. Marcus "Goodie" Goodloe recently spoke on the DBU campus, sharing excerpts from his new book, King Maker: Applying Dr. Martin Luther King Jr.'s Leadership Lessons in Working with Athletes and Entertainers.

Goodloe received his Ph.D. in Leadership Studies from DBU in 2011. Goodloe decided to combine his love for history with his understanding of athletics and honed in on the ways in which Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr., strove to utilize athletes and entertainers for the cause of Civil Rights in the 1960s. He explored how MLK recognized that these public figures held a unique role of influence in society and developed relationships with them for the purposes of bettering their world.

Goodloe lives in Los Angeles with his wife, Lucy, and their two children, Hannah and Joshua. He is currently serving as the associate teaching pastor at Parkcrest Church in Lakewood, California.



### DR. RANDEL EVERETT SHARES AT 2015 MASTON LECTURE

Dallas Baptist University and the T. B. Maston Foundation recently hosted Dr. Randel Everett on the DBU campus on Monday, October 26, 2015. Dr. Everett was the featured speaker of the T. B. Maston Lecture Series. Founded in 1985, the Lecture Series provides funds for Baptist schools throughout Texas to host leading Christian thinkers as they address various ethical topics from a Christ-centered perspective.

Dr. Everett is President and Founder of the 21st Century Wilberforce Initiative, an organization working "to create a world where religious freedom is recognized by nations across the globe as a fundamental human right." He spent four decades pastoring churches and also founded The John Leland Center for Theological Studies, in addition to his service as a leader of the Baptist General Convention of Texas.

# DR. GREG AMMONS RECEIVES HONORARY DEGREE

Dr. Greg Ammons, senior pastor of First Baptist Church Garland and DBU trustee, received an honorary doctorate during the August 2015 DBU commencement services.

Growing up in southeastern Oklahoma, Greg Ammons gave his life to the Lord at the age of nine. While in high school, he sensed a call to the ministry and decided to pursue a degree in religion and eventually went to seminary. After beginning his seminary training, he began serving full time as a pastor, serving first at his home church of First Baptist Boswell as an associate pastor and interim pastor. From there, he became senior pastor of Floyd Baptist Church in Greenville, Texas, and quickly developed a reputation for being a caring pastor, focused on discipleship and evangelism. During this time, he also married the love of his life, Lisa.

After six years in Greenville, the couple moved to Faith Baptist Church, Iowa Park, Texas, in 1990, and in 1997, he was named Iowa Park Citizen of the Year. In 2004, First Baptist Church, Garland, called him to be their senior pastor.

Dr. Ammons is involved in denominational life, having served on various committees of the Dallas Baptist Association and the Baptist General Convention of Texas, as well as serving on the Advisory Board of Hope Clinic, a faith-based medical clinic for the uninsured in Garland. In 2011, he was named to the Dallas Baptist University Board of Trustees, and this past spring, the Trustees selected him to serve on the DBU Presidential Search Committee. When he is not preaching, teaching, or involved in denominational or community service, he can be heard broadcasting sporting events for Cumulus Radio.

#### DR. SUE KAVLI NAMED OAK CLIFF EDUCATOR OF THE YEAR



Dr. Sue Kavli, director of research and professor of leadership and research for the Gary Cook School of Leadership at DBU, was awarded the College Educator of the Year award by the Oak Cliff Chamber of Commerce.

A Houston native, Dr. Kavli attended the University of North Dakota, majoring in mathematics, and there met

her future husband, Steve, with whom she would not only build a wonderful life but also an incredible ministry. While in seminary, she spent two years serving in Nigeria as a missionary before returning home and marrying Steve. After the birth of her daughters, Rebecca and Sarah, Dr. Kavli served as a professor at Alvin Community College in Texas.

It was during this time that the Lord called her family back to the mission field. For the next ten years, they served as missionaries to Thailand, where she served as a supervisor for short-term personnel and directed a non-profit cottage industry providing over 300 Thai individuals with the ability to not only make a living but also hear the Gospel. She also helped launch mobile medical clinics and an outreach program to the largest women's prison in Thailand. In addition, she taught classes in basic computer literacy and helped develop the first Thai character set for early microcomputers.

In 1998, they returned to the U. S., having already completed two graduate degrees, Sue began work on her Ph.D. in Organizational Management while she also served as the director of information technology for a college in North Carolina. In 2004, she completed her doctorate, and the following year, she joined the faculty of Dallas Baptist University. In 2009, Dr. Kavli was also named the DBU Professor of the Year. In 2015, she received a Master of Arts in Christian Education from DBU.

Sue and Steve live in The Colony, and are active members of First Baptist Church of Lewisville.

Bob Burgin has the heart of a teacher, and for the past 16 years, he has been training up the next generation of teachers to take his same love for students and zeal for the Lord into the classroom.

Prior to his arrival in 1999, Professor Burgin spent two decades in the Arlington ISD as a teacher and administrator, serving as assistant principal and principal for Nichols Junior High School and as principal for Arlington High School. Although he officially retired from the Arlington ISD in 1993, he returned to teaching in 1999 at the invitation of Dr. Gary Cook, DBU president, who asked him to help the DBU College of Education prepare future teachers. During his time at DBU, he served as an assistant professor of education and associate dean, as well as the director of secondary education. He also helped to lead the school to receive the top ranking in the nation for elementary educator preparation from the National Council on Teacher Quality.

From 1966-1978, Burgin and his wife, Tillie, served as missionaries in Korea. That same desire to share Christ with others carried over to their work in Arlington as Tillie began in 1986 the nationally recognized outreach ministry, Mission Arlington, and leads it to this day. The Burgins have two sons, Jim and Rick, five grandchildren, and two great grandchildren. Currently, Bob is serving as pastor of Parkview Fellowship Church, which is a part of Mission Arlington.
