
HIGHLIGHTS

Bernie Spooner: Editor and Author of *Pastor, Staff, and Congregational Relationships*

Dallas Baptist University's Dr. Bernie Spooner, professor of Christian education in the Graduate School of Ministry, recently served as general editor and author of *Pastor, Staff, and Congregational Relationships: Through Servant Leadership and Quality Administration.*

This book addresses the need for a fresh comprehensive approach to building relationships among pastors, church staff leaders, and church members by using a combination of servant leadership and good administrative skills. As general editor, Dr. Spooner recruited a team of experienced pastors, staff leaders, and laypeople to assist in the compilation of this work.

Dr. Spooner arrived at DBU in 2003 to serve as the inaugural dean of the Gary Cook School of Leadership. Prior to that, he served as head of the Bible Study and Discipleship Division of the Baptist General Convention of Texas. He has fifteen years of experience in local church ministry and more than three decades of experience as a seminary and university professor.

Dr. Spooner and his wife, Pat, are members of Plymouth Park Baptist Church in Irving. They have two daughters, Joan and Jane, and four grandchildren.



Julie Carlisle, director of payroll, was named the 2014 Staff Member of the Year at Dallas Baptist University.

Carlisle joined the DBU staff in 1991 as director of payroll. She also serves as an adjunct instructor, as staff sponsor of the Japanese Student Society, and was a previous executive committee member for the Women's Auxiliary Board. Dallas Baptist University was recently recognized by the Arbor Day Foundation as a 2013 Tree Campus USA university. To obtain this distinction, Robert Erickson, DBU director of landscaping and special projects, oversaw the work to ensure that the University met five core standards for effective campus forest management: a tree advisory committee, a campus tree-care plan, dedicated annual expenditures for its campus tree program, and an Arbor Day observance and student service-learning project.

Tree Campus USA is a national program launched in 2008 by the Arbor Day Foundation and Toyota. Their purpose is to engage leaders of universities and colleges to promote healthy trees and engage students and staff in the spirit of conservation.

"We understand the calling we have to teach our students about making a lifelong commitment to being wise and responsible stewards of the rich resources and beautiful planet God has entrusted to us," explained Dr. Blair Blackburn, DBU executive vice president.

DBU has been recognized as a Tree Campus USA university since 2010. Since Dr. Gary Cook's tenure as President of Dallas Baptist University beginning in 1988, over 2,200 trees have been planted on the DBU campus. DBU is among only nine colleges in Texas to achieve this award for a commitment to promote urban reforestation and engage the campus community in environmental stewardship.
